OF THE

Young Ladies' Academy of the Visitation,

CABANNE PLACE, ST. LOUIS, MO.

THIS Academy, a branch of that established in this country in 1799, ranks among the oldest and best patronized Educational Institutions, and is conducted by the Religious Sisters of the Order of the Visitation, founded in 1610, in Haute-Savoie, France, by St. Francis, Count of Sales, and Ste. Jane Frances, Baroness of Chantal.

Its location combines the advantages both of country and city, occupying an elevated, healthy and beautiful site in the western part of the city, possessing shaded walks, ample grounds, an extensive and commodious range of buildings, with well-ventilated and spacious rooms and halls, with gymnasium and bowling alley for exercise in inclement weather.

The hot-water system of heating is used with most gratifying results to both health and comfort. No expense has been spared to provide the most complete lavatory system throughout the establishment.

The Washington Avenue electric cars run quite near the Convent on the south, and the St. Louis and Suburban on the north, making the Academy accessible at any time in about thirty-five minutes from the center or business portion of the city.

General Regulations.

The scholastic year is divided into two sessions, beginning on the second Tuesday of September and the last Monday of January.

Payment for each session required invariably in advance. No pupil will be allowed to enter upon a new session until all expenses attending a previous one have been liquidated.

Reference required from persons unknown to the Institution. Pupils are received at any time of the year, their session dating from day of entrance.

No deduction is made for absence, except in case of protracted illness, nor for withdrawal before the close of term.

Pupils of any religious denomination are received, provided they conform to the regulations of the school.

No money will be advanced for clothing or other needs, hence sufficient funds must be deposited with the Directress to defray incidental expenses.

Breakage of furniture, etc., or damage of any kind to building, piano or other Acadamy property, will be charged to the pupils' account or taken from their pocket money.

No credit account will be allowed in town. It is requested that dressmaking and dentistry be attended to at home, as such matters increase the duties of the teachers; besides the student's mind should be free from thoughts of dress as far as possible. A list of correspondents, signed by the parents, should be sent when the pupil is entered.

Reports of pupils' progress are sent to parents and guardians from time to time.

The young ladies receive visits on Thursdays, but these visits must be authorized by parents, as well as sanctioned by the Directress, the reception time beginning at one o'clock and terminating at five in Winter and six in Summer. Interruptions in classwork have been found to be detrimental to the improvement of the pupils, therefore on school days no young lady is

accessible to callers, except on an extraordinary occasion. Pupils are permitted to visit their parents at stated times. Those who fail to return on the appointed day forfeit their honors. The Christmas holidays begin on the twenty third of December and end on the third of January.

All letters written or received by pupils are subject to inspection.

The Government of the Academy

Is eminently maternal. Every effort is made to compensate children for separation from home and friends, and to subject them to such discipline only as is essential to good order and the formation of habits of self-control, which constitute the foundation of happiness in after-life.

No one who evinces a spirit of insubordination too strong to be overcome by the mild, but firm government of the Institution will be kept after the fact becomes apparent. The same is true of those who do not prove equal to the recommendation on which they were received.

The pupils must cultivate an amiable disposition, polite deportment and gentle manners. Strict attention must be paid to the use of correct and refined language. At the completion of the entire English course a diploma and gold medal are conferred, but to receive them the pupil must have likewise merited the reward of exemplary conduct.

At the close of the scholastic year a premium for scholarship is awarded in each class to the pupil who has taken full course, passed final examinations and attained the highest average.

Wardrobe, Etc.

Boarders are required to bring with them the following articles, each distinctly marked with owner's full name (marking done at the Institution charged): Eight changes of underwear, three changes of woolen underwear, eight pairs of hose, four plain colored underskirts (two heavy for Winter, two

lighter for Fall and Spring), two pairs of shoes, two dozen handkerchiefs, one wrapper, eight towels (two large ones for bathing), six untrimmed black aprons, a sun bonnet or hat, three yards of wash blonde and two of black net (for veils), one double blanket, a heavy cape, with hood attached, for Winter, and a pair of gum overshoes; one furnished workbox or basket and toilet case, a rug or two yards of carpet, six napkins and napkin ring, a tumbler or silver goblet, a dessert and a teaspoon, a knife and fork, one black blouse waist used for calisthenic exercises.

Uniform.

Each pupil, on entering, should be furnished with two uniform dresses of black cashmere or other woolen goods, made perfectly plain, without trimming of any kind and without train. Those who are delinquent on this point may expect to have their dresses remodeled. Each pupil should also be furnished with one white dress of simple material, made plain. In Summer two waists of lighter black goods, such as sateen, linen lawn, China silk, etc., replace the woolen ones.

Colored dresses and white skirts are not allowed.

For children under twelve, besides six black aprons, three white ones are required. An inventory of the above must be sent with each trunk.

Pupils are requested not to bring watches or other jewelry, as the Institution will not be responsible.

Art and Music Department

Art Department.

The Art Course is modeled after the methods approved by the experience of the best Art Schools.

Regular instruction includes Perspective, Artistic Anatomy, Modeling, Drawing and Painting from casts and life.

The Studio, besides being furnished with all modern appliances for the furtherance of Art in every department, is kept informed of progress in the Art World; its Library showing the best methods and productions of the day.

Department of Music.

PIANO, ORGAN, HARP, VIOLIN, GUITAR, BANJO, MANDOLIN,
HARMONY AND THEORY.

In the majority of cases, in our Institution, the study of Music in one or more of the branches above mentioned, is pursued in connection with that of the English Course, thereby precluding the possibility of the pupil devoting to it the requisite amount of time for the accomplishment of great results. Yet, by a judicious and faithful employment of the hour or hours set apart for practice, much may be accomplished; and the pupil may succeed either in laying the foundation for future artistic development, or may at least gain such practical skill as to be able to contribute to the enjoyment of friends by a correct and agreeable interpretation of the compositions of the best authors.

In addition to the Technical and Theoretical studies assigned for each grade, the compositions of the classic and

modern authors are gradually introduced, thereby at once relieving the monotony and irksomeness arising from too long and uninterrupted practice of exercises, and directing the pupil in the formation of a correct and refined taste.

Piano.

The Piano Course embraces thirteen grades. A pupil of great talent and application may, it is true, complete more than one grade a year, but experience shows that by far the greater number finish but one, and many fail even to do that. On the other hand, there are exceptional cases in which two or perhaps three grades are accomplished in one year; but this only occurs when a pupil, possessed of a remarkable talent and a well-formed hand, is sufficiently at leisure to employ at *least* three or four hours daily in practice.

Promotion is made from one grade to another whenever advantageous to the pupil.

Private examinations are held at least twice during the year. Among the advantages resulting therefrom may be mentioned the establishment of uniformity in the method of instruction pursued throughout the institution. A correct and impartial grading of the pupils is also greatly facilitated. The majority of those who enter our classes are placed below the Fifth Grade, owing to the fact that, even when possessed of some facility in reading music and a naturally correct idea of time, nearly all are deficient in rudimental knowledge, and few succeed in passing beyond the Eighth or Ninth Grade.

The study of Harmony is obligatory in the higher grades. A GOLD GRADUATING MEDAL is awarded to her who successfully completes the thorough and exacting course of studies of Violin, Piano, Harp or Vocal Department.

With regard to the other branches mentioned above, the system of grading, etc., is common to all.

It may, however, be well to remark here, that Mason's School of Touch and Technic, which forms an important feature of our curriculum, was introduced immediately after

its publication a few years since, and has been used with the most gratifying results. In short, the work offers, in its four volumes, finger exercises, scales, arpeggios, octaves and bravura, with its peculiar exercise forms and method of practice, material eminently calculated to develop artistic Piano playing.

Violin.

The work in this department includes a careful study of Violin Technique, and of works of representative classic and modern composers, in the form of studies, solos and ensemble playing, graded according to the needs of the individual student.

The Voice.

Private Vocal Lessons are given only to such pupils as are gifted with a good natural voice, and sufficient talent to improve it by cultivation.

A thorough system of respiration is inculcated in connection with the best Italian method of vocalization. The vocal class is a preparatory one, the Rudiments of Music, Sight-Reading and Breathing being taught in connection with Vocal Technics and Songs. It is advisable that all pupils should pursue the exercises of the class in connection with private lessons.

Part-singing enters largely into our system of Vocal training, being introduced at an early stage in Duet and simple Chorus form, and continued later in Trio, Quartette, Quintette, etc. Masses, Oratorios, Operettas, and Part-songs of classic and modern authors furnish material for the great chorus drills.


Private vocal pupils, together with the most efficient members of the class, form the choir of the Institution, and take part in all the important Vocal works studied during the year.

Musicales, at which those sufficiently advanced are required to perform vocal and instrumental selections without notes, take place once a month.

The various Departments—Piano, Violin, Harp, Voice, etc., are under the direction of accomplished musicians and experienced teachers.

A Musical Library, well equipped with an unusual number of works for study and reading under the heads of Biography, Histories of Music, Æsthetics of Music, Dictionaries, Criticism and Essays, is at the disposal of pupils and teachers, thereby promoting a more intelligent appreciation of the Art.

Within the school, Literary Circles have been formed in each department, and Literary and Musical Recitations are given every month by the pupils in the presence of the teachers and the assembled school.



French.

French is taught throughout the Course of Studies, but is only obligatory in the Senior Department.

The Berlitz method of teaching modern languages is that employed in the institution, the experience of years having convinced us of its superiority over every other as a means towards the acquirement of a correct and practical use of a foreign idiom.

By this method, the training of the ear and tongue precedes that of the eye, thus presenting a system thoroughly in accord with the principles of modern pedagogy. In other words, "the thing before the sign" is the keynote to the system. Object lessons and conversation form the leading features and go hand in hand with Grammar and Composition throughout the course.

In the Primary Department much time is given to memory work and simple conversational phrases, with daily drill in the sounds of the language. As the pupil advances, supplementary work—such as the memorizing of fables, poems, etc., and the reading of modern and classic French prose and dramatic writers—is introduced when required.

Completion of the Course qualifies the student for entrance upon the first or even second year of a College Course, which latter may be given by the Academy in special cases if desired.

The College Course comprises the study of the best models of the literature of the Seventeenth, Eighteenth and Nineteenth centuries in prose, poetry and drama. The pupil is required to present in original French a sketch of each author and one or more of his works.
