


St. Elizabeth of Hungary Church

St. Elizabeth's Church might well be called the origin of all the activities pictured on the following pages. From her humble birth back in 1858 as a chapel in the old St. Xavier Church on Ninth St., during her adolescent years while located at Fourteenth and Gay Sts., where she was dedicated a church by Bishop Ryan in 1873, to her mature life spent since 1912 at her present location on Pine St., she has been the center from which many religious and spiritual activities have emanated.

During her most fruitful years St. Elizabeth's Church purchased the property on which St. Bernadette's School now stands; published St. Elizabeth's Chronicle which has since grown into the nationally recognized Interracial Review; inaugurated closed retreats for women and. later on, for men; presented an annual musical comedy for some years; established a Council of the Knights of St. Peter Claver in St. Louis; was host to the largest and most successful convention of Negro Catholics in the history of the country; spon-

sored for a long time an interracial hour broadcast weekly over Station WEW; sent two young women and one young man into the religious life; assisted in opening St. Mary's Infirmary to Negroes; secured the present St. Elizabeth's School building; instructed, baptized and had confirmed in the Faith, with the help of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, thousands of souls. During all these years St. Elizabeth's flourishing Sodalities and numerous organizations carried her good influence throughout the city and country.

Helpers of the Holy Souls

In spite of the fact that the Helpers of the Holy Souls have a Convent at 4012 Washington Blvd. and conduct St. Benedict's Center at 3950 W. Belle Ave., they seem to be all over the City. This is due to the multiplicity of their work. Just how they get around to so many places and are able to do so many things is something of a mystery. Four days a week they teach catechism to public school children at diverse places; they conduct sewing classes for large girls, clubs for little girls; have boy, girl, cub and brownie scout troops; teach home economic classes weekly for mothers; engage in many Red Cross activities; almost every evening supervise recreation periods for high school boys and girls; frequently prepare the sick for receiving Holy Communion and, literally, go about here, there and everywhere doing good. They visit the hospitals, spread good reading matter about and frequently lead a stray sheep back to the fold. And they never seem to get tired. Approximately 550 children are under their care. They even have a drum and bugle corps and on Saturdays conduct games and arteraft classes for boys.





St. Malachy's Church

St. Malachy's Church has been in charge of the Jesuit Fathers since 1941. The first thing attended to was the renovation of the school, which now holds 250 children under the teaching care of the Daughters of Charity. It can now point with pride to a men's club, a ladies' club and a young ladies' club; a League of Promotors of the Sacred Heart, a Sanctuary Society, a thriving Credit Union and a retail commodities co-operative. The grad-


uation exercises of St. Mary's Infirmary School of Nursing are held in St. Malachy's Hall, which also serves as the weekly meeting place for a large group of teen-age youngsters. In carrying on the activities of the Church the St. Malachy's Aid Society has been of great assistance to the Pastor, whose jurisdiction is city-wide since the work of the Church is not confined within parish limits. A promising future lies ahead.

Interior of St. Malachy's Churc's, 2000 Clark Ave., St. Louis








Efforts to erect St. Malachy's Day Nursery and Community Center have been going on for almost two years. The need for such an institution has been demonstrated by both public and private surveys. The project has the approval of both ecclesiastical and civic authorities and agencies. After this preliminary investigation the work of raising a building fund has been going on. A generous benefactor has donated a very desirable site for the new build-

ing. A solid foundation is already in place and plans for the superstructure have been approved. To assist in raising funds for carrying on this work the St. Malachy's Building Fund has been established and a permanent organization known as St. Malachy's Day Nursery Interracial Committee has been set up. It is hoped that, with the help of charitable citizens of St. Louis, work on this sorely needed institution will soon be under way.

FINE SCHOOL FOR GIRLS is conducted by the Oblate Sisters of Providence at 4650 S. Broadway, St. Louis. This religious congregation was founded in 1829 in Baltimore, Maryland. At the present time it numbers about 290 Sisters with headquarters in Baltimore and foundations in the Archdioceses of Baltimore and Washington, Chicago and St. Louis, and the dioceses of Charleston, Leavenworth and Richmond. In addition to St. Rita Academy these Sisters conduct St. Frances Orphan Home at Normandy, Missouri.





St. Joseph High School

St. Joseph High School was established in August, 1937, in a building on Washington Blvd. loaned for this purpose by the late Rt. Rev. Msgr. Patrick Dunne. The entire faculty, at its opening, consisted of two V Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet. Thirteen students were enrolled. In 1939, due to the increased enrollment, the school was moved into larger quarters on West Belle Ave. Two years later, in 1941, another change was necessary and this time St. Joseph High School took up its present residence at 4132

Page Blvd. where it enrolled 120 students. In 1945 this number had increased to 170. The faculty has also grown to include six Sisters of St. Joseph, assisted by two priests and two lay choral instructors. The question uppermost in the minds of both faculty and students is: where do we go from here? St. Joseph High School offers a full four-year high school course and is accredited temporarily with the University of Missouri, pending the time when war conditions will permit the erection of a new building.

St. Joseph's High School owes a great deal to the Patrons Association and to its president, Mr. O. L. Lancaster. This Association comes to the rescue in many ways by providing school equipment of various kinds and also by sponsoring the student socials and recreation activities. The Torch Light Club is one of the active student organizations. It is a dramatic club whose purpose is to foster interest in current plays and books. It pre-

sents a play of its own each year and has frequently appeared before the student body of other schools. St. Joseph High School has competed very successfully in the inter-school oratorical contests, winning first place in original oratory on one occassion and on another won second place in the original speech contest in the radio division. Several graduates of St. Joseph High School are pursuing their higher studies in St. Louis University.









St. Frances Home Continued

The orphan children cared for at St. Frances Home receive a thoroughly Catholic training and education. St. Frances Home Continued

The present building at St. Frances Home can accommodate 80 children. Recently 59 children had to be denied admission simply because there was no room for them. For this reason the Community proposes to construct a modern fireproof building to contain class rooms, kindergarten and dormitories for 150 orphans. There will also be a chapel and auditorium-gymnasium. There will actually be three buildings or units which, for the sake of convenience as well as economy, will be joined

into a single structure. There will be nothing elegant or elaborate. No waste in space or materials. The Community will concentrate on efficiency and good construction looking to a maximum of life for the building and a minimum of maintenance costs and repairs. Through bequests, the financial assistance of friends, particularly the work of the St. Frances Orphan Association, and from other sources, the Sisters have started a building fund.



St. Nicholas Church, 19th and Lucas Aves., St. Louis








St. Nicholas Parish Continued

Prior to the coming of the Fathers of the Divine Word to St. Nicholas Parish, Jesuit Scholastics from St. Louis University, under the able leadership of the then Mr. William Markoe, S.J., had begun to catechize the children in the neighborhood. The result of their efforts was the reclaiming of the old St. Nicholas school building that had been sold and was being used as a warehouse. The school opened in September, 1924, with over 500 children trying to register. Two Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament were in charge. Now Sisters of the Most Precious Blood conduct the school.

Holy Guardian Angels Mission

Holy Guardian Angels Mission is the most complete mission in the St. Louis area. It was started in 1926 by Reverend Arnold Garvey, S.J., who resided at the time at St. Stanislaus Seminary, Florissant, Mo., and who already was carrying on the work of Bl. Martin de Porres Mission at Robertson, Mo. The present priest in charge of the mission


compound is Father Otto Moorman, S.J. He has added much to the work that had such a humble beginning. The mission at present comprises a church, rectory, thriving school, hall for social gatherings, a medical center, and a modern, up-to-date retreat house where men from near and far gather to make three-day closed retreats.

St. Clement Mission

St. Clement Mission, consisting of a chapel and school on Finney Ave., St. Louis, was founded by the Redemptorist Fathers of St. Alphonsus "Rock" Church in 1941. The school faculty is composed of five Oblate Sisters of Providence who have their own Convent nearby. They started with 90 pupils in five grades and now have 203 pupils in eight grades. A Sodality of

Mary, League of the Sacred Heart and fine choir are a few of the school organizations. The boys have taken part in interparochial basketball and softball games. Three Masses are offered in the chapel each Sunday. A Holy Name Society, Altar Society, Sacred Heart League, Youth Club and Parents-Teachers Association are to be found among the Mission organizations.






Our Lady of the Visitation Parish Church



HE SACRED HEART CENTER, located at 4406 Garfield Ave., St. Louis, is under the direction of the Pastor of Our Lady of the Visitation Parish and is conducted by the Helpers of the Holy Souls. Some 200 children are cared for here. Catholic

children attending the public schools in the neighborhood meet here to learn their catechism. The Center has its own band, a girl scout troop and a dramatic club that presents an occasional play. Through these contacts with the children the work of the Center spreads out to include much social work of a religious nature throughout the neighborhood in which the Center is located. The good influence of such centers as this is spread far and wide and helps to solve many difficult problems of a social and religious nature.

St. Peter Claver Mission

St. Peter Claver Mission got its start back in 1916 when young men studying for the priesthood at St. Stanislaus Seminary, eight miles away, trudged back and forth to teach catechism to the inhabitants of what was then called Anglum. Now it boasts of a full-time missionary who not only performs all the duties of a country pastor but who hopes soon to build a school.


St. Mary's Infirmary

St. Mary's Infirmary, the first hospital owned by the Sisters of St. Mary, has been serving the sick and the poor as a general hospital ever since 1877. It has its own staff of physicians and nursing staff composed of Sisters of St. Mary, aided by St. Mary's School of Nursing. This School of Nursing offers a three year course leading to a certificate of Graduate in Nursing, qualifying the graduate nurse for the usual State Board Examination, thus enabling her to become a registered nurse. The Nursing School

is fully accredited by the Missouri State Board of Nurse Examiners. The staff of instructors is composed of members of the St. Louis University School of Medicine, the staff of St. Mary's Infirmary and the Sisters of St. Mary. Students are drawn to this nursing school from all parts of the country and a very high standard is maintained. The present nurses' home is the original hospital building. The School of Nursing is affiliated with the United States Cadet Nurse Corps.


St. Mary's School of Nursing

Because the present accommodations of St. Mary's School of Nursing are inadequate many applicants for admission must be rejected. Consequently a new home that will furnish housing facilities for 100 nurses is under construction. When this is completed it will enable St. Mary's Infirmary and School of Nursing to be of still greater service to the Community.



Jo Sum Up....

The work described and illustrated on the foregoing pages of this pictorial booklet shows how much has been and is being accomplished by the Church in that portion of the Lord's Vineyard for which the Holy Father, Pope Pius XII, in His Encyclical Letter to the American Hierarchy, Sertum Laetitiae, says He feels "a special paternal affection." Surely this work must be most pleasing to the Holy Father. It must also gladden the heart of that great Apostle, St. Paul, who constantly reminds us that we "are all the children of God through faith in Christ. For all you who have been baptized into Christ, have put on Christ.
